There are a few carts outside the front door where you can browse for new books for adults and children, as well as new DVDs. Wi-fi service is also available outside in the same area.

By visiting slolibrary.org, you can find many resources that are available to us. There is so much more than just searching the catalog, although that is fun, too. You can read newspapers and magazines on-line, as well as attend virtual classes and lectures. So much is available, that it can't all be listed here. I encourage you to check it out. Now that we have more time on our hands, there is much to explore.

Our staff of internet sales workers are still working from home, although they are not as busy as before. Two board members who never stopped working are our treasurer, **Donna Kimber**, and our assistant treasurer, **Sandy Stellway**. Bills still must be paid, tax forms must be filled out, and funds need to be distributed for library materials. Donna and Sandy have done an outstanding job keeping things orderly and professional. FROM THE YOUTH CORNER...

We are still doing Sidewalk Service and it is great to see how much our kids are reading. I help kids pick out a pile of books one week and then they return to get another huge stack the next week. I love to see that!

A new Tale Trail is up now. This is one is called *Honeybee: the busy life of apis mellifera* by Candice Fleming and is presented in conjunction with the Cuesta College Book of the Year *The Honey Bus* by Meredith May. The Tale Trail is located directly behind the library near the grassy area next to the Regional Center.

We have two bee friendly youth Grab and Go Crafts to give away in March and April. The first kit is a fun spring beehive craft kit for kids ages 6-12 and the second is a home to make for bees for kids ages 8 and up. Both kids can be picked up at the library, to make at home, and are available while supplies last. The kits have everything that kids need to complete the project.

Again, this year we are participating in the *In N Out Cover to Cover* reading incentive program. Kids can earn three burger coupons by reading fifteen books of their choice. Children between the ages of four and twelve can participate. The program runs until April 17.

Because April is Poetry Month I would like to share some teen books in verse that adults will also enjoy.

The Snow Fell Three Graves Deep by poet and novelist Allan Wolf is a riveting retelling of the ill-fated journey of the Donner party across the Sierra Nevadas during the winter of 1846 and 1847. Brilliantly narrated by multiple voices, including world-weary, taunting, and all-knowing Hunger itself, this novel-in-verse examines a notorious chapter in history from various perspectives, among them caravan leaders George Donner and James Reed, Donner's scholarly wife, two Miwok Indian guides, the Reed children, a sixteen-year-old orphan, and even a pair of oxen.

White Rose by Kip Wilson tells the story of Sophie Scholl, a young German college student who challenges the Nazi regime during World War II as part of the White Rose, a non-violent resistance group.

Brown Girl Dreaming by Jacqueline Woodson shares, in vivid poems, what it was like to grow up as an African American in the 1960s and 1970s, living with the remnants of Jim Crow and her growing awareness of the Civil Rights movement.
