We also support Their Library Bill of Rights and Freedom to Read statements. (Goto: ala.org and search to read them) This information can be found on the ALA.org website mostly under the Advocacy, Legislation, and Issues heading. We believe that our Library Patrons have the intelligence to decide for themselves and their family what they want to read.

## **Library Bill of Rights**

The American Library Association affirms that all libraries are forums for information and ideas, and that the following basic policies should guide their services.

**I.** Books and other library resources should be provided for the interest, information, and enlightenment of all people of the community the library serves. Materials should not be excluded because of the origin, background, or views of those contributing to their creation.

**II.** Libraries should provide materials and information presenting all points of view on current and historical issues. Materials should not be proscribed or removed because of partisan or doctrinal disapproval.


**III.** Libraries should challenge censorship in the fulfillment of their responsibility to provide information and enlightenment.

**IV.** Libraries should cooperate with all persons and groups concerned with resisting abridgment of free expression and free access to ideas.

V. A person's right to use a library should not be denied or abridged because of origin, age, background, or views.

VI. Libraries which make exhibit spaces and meeting rooms available to the public they serve should make such facilities available on an equitable basis, regardless of the beliefs or affiliations of individuals or groups requesting their use.

**VII.** All people, regardless of origin, age, background, or views, possess a right to privacy and confidentiality in their library use. Libraries should advocate for, educate about, and protect people's privacy, safeguarding all library use data, including personally identifiable information.

# **LIBRARY NEWS**

The Arroyo Grande Library is thrilled to announce that we are the recipient of a \$1.6 million dollar California State Library Grant to remodel the building and bring it up to current safety standards. The County of San Luis Obispo Board of Supervisors has approved the grant and selected Reiss Design studios for the remodel design. The Arroyo Grande Library is slated to close sometime next year and will remain closed for about a year, while our building is brought up to code. In future newsletters I will be sharing more information about the date the library will be closing, alternate library services, and how long we will be closed. I do not have all the details about that yet. We will continue to improve the current library while we await our big remodel project.

Our Branch Out outreach van has been getting some serious mileage this summer, thanks to the planning of AG librarians Kate McMillen and Sallie Tonascia. Kate brought the outreach van to the Oceano Dunes Visitor Center each Wednesday in June. One family of 9 people actually clapped, cheered, and jumped up and down when they won books on the prize wheel, saying, "We are all going to be reading tonight!" The Library brought the van to Lopez Lake Marina during the month of July. Sallie brought stories and crafts to the Boys and Girls Club summer camp on Thursdays in June and July. The kids at summer camp really enjoyed her visits. We had 455 people stop by our Elm Street Art in the Park booth on June 10th, many getting library cards, learning about the library, or just dropping by to say hi and do a craft. This stop was so successful we will bring the van out to the September Art in the Park as well.

The Summer Reading Program went really well. We had over 100 kids at our kickoff party, that featured music, giant bubbles, and outdoor games (thanks Nipomo), messy art, and glitter tattoos. We have also had great attendance at our Taiko drumming, magic show, Pokémon party and messy art programs. Patrons loved the staff t-shirts, bags, and activity guides. The SLO Library Foundation will soon be offering these items for the public to purchase for themselves. We have also had quite a few visitors on the "quail trail." One adult that signed up for our adult reading program got so excited for summer she said, "Thank you! I'm going to apply for a library card and start reading again!" Our watercolor program for adults was packed and we hosted photography, a local teen author talk, and comics classes. This summer AG staff member, Barbara Leaders, brought macrame and tin art to County of SLO libraries in June and July. We really are lucky to have such a crafty staff. Thank you to the FOTAGL for supporting our Summer Reading Program this year. It really helped make the program great!

Kate McMillen's Teen Advisory Board (TAB) group continues to grow into a nice group of regular members. TAB group members volunteered at our SRP kickoff party and messy art programs, with great success. We love seeing our local teens volunteer to make our Library a great place.
